

Undergraduate Student Exit Survey Results



Spring 2016 Undergraduates Income Brackets



There are 34 Spring 2016 undergraduate students (12%) enrolled in a graduate program.

POINTS OF INTEREST:


As graduation approached, graduating seniors were required to complete a survey that asked questions about their employment/career status, acceptance to graduate studies, and income level. These numbers are presented visually in this report.

This chart shows that of the graduating seniors who participated in the survey, about 45% of them reported being unemployed at the time of graduation.

This chart shows the income level of the employed Spring 2016 undergraduates who participated in the survey.


The majority (25%) of the undergraduate student surveys revealed an income less than \$15,000.






This chart shows that 42% of the undergraduate students surveyed reported being unemployed, 13% reported being part-time, and 45% reported being full-time at the time of graduation.

Fall 2015 Ungraduates Income Brackets




This chart shows the income level of the fall 2015 graduating seniors who participated in the survey. Approximately 175 undergraduate students were surveyed. The surveys revealed that 31% of the graduating seniors who are employed receive an income of less than \$15,000.



Spring 2016 Undergraduates Enrolled in Graduate Program


This chart shows how many spring 2016 undergraduate students are enrolled in a graduate program and in which graduate programs they are enrolled.



Spring 2016 Graduate Student Exit Survey Results


This chart shows the employment status of the spring 2016 graduates. About 83% of the graduate students surveyed reported being employed full-time, and 17% reported being unemployed at the time of graduation. There were no graduate students employed part-time.

Spring 2016 Graduate Student Income brackets




This chart shows the income level of the spring 2016 graduates. About 4% more graduate students surveyed revealed an income between \$35,000 - \$45,000.

Employment Status of the Fall 2015 Graduates



Fall 2015 Graduate Student Income Brackets


This chart shows the income level of the fall 2015 graduates. A higher number of graduate students revealed making a salary between \$35,000 - \$45,000.



Number of Employer Participation in Career Fairs


This chart shows the number of employers that attended the career fairs. The number increased by nine for the Spring 2016 Career Fair.






This chart shows the number of students who attended the carer fair. The Spring 2016 Career Fair had 86 more students in attendance.

Full-time and Part-time Jobs Posted May 2015 - April 2016


