School of Business, Statement of Mission:

Accredited at both the graduate and undergraduate levels, the School of Business at Francis Marion University has a mission of teaching, research and service. Nearly all our faculty holds a doctorate in the area in which they teach. Our small classroom environment promotes interaction among students and faculty. We teach students to think logically, communicate effectively, develop an understanding and appreciation of the global business environment, and be guided by high ethical standards. Our students develop conceptual and analytical skills needed to be successful leaders in both private and public institutions.

Goals of the School of Business:

- Our students will know the core concepts with each business discipline: accounting, business economics, finance, management, management information systems and marketing.

Course Description: Introduces the planning and control aspects of internal accounting. Topics include cost systems, cost behavior, direct costing, capital budgeting, decentralized operations, relevant costs, operations budgeting, differential cost, and variance analysis.

Prerequisites: ACTG 201

Text and/or References: Noreen, Brewer, Garrison. <u>Managerial Accounting for</u> <u>Managers 4th edition with Connect</u>, (McGraw-Hill/Irwin, 2017). 613 pages.

You <u>must</u> have access to a text, to Connect (the homework manager).

Class Attendance Policy: I have no policy on attendance. Also, I will not automatically drop you from this course for excessive absences. If you wish to withdraw from this course, you must initiate and complete that action prior to the applicable University deadline. Although you may be absent, class will continue and you will be responsible for any assignment given, including the setting of a date for a test.

While I do not have a specific policy on attendance, I do record attendance. If you arrive after I have recorded attendance for the day, you will be considered absent. If you leave early you will be considered absent. If you do not have the resources required for the course, you will be considered absent. If you are asleep, you will be considered absent. If you are asleep, you will be considered absent. In other words, you must be participating in the class to be considered present.

Test Days: On test days, you will not be allowed to enter the classroom after the test has begun! (Remember, there are no make-up tests.)

Academic Integrity: It is expected that students will adhere to university policy. For homework, students are encouraged to discuss their answers with others. For tests, examinations, and projects, the work is to be solely that of the individual student (or assigned group) without collaboration. Any case of academic dishonesty may result in an "F" for the course or other sanctions as deemed appropriate by the instructor and in accordance with university policy.

Classroom Protocol: The use of cell phones, pagers and other electronic communication devices during class is prohibited. **(Note: You may <u>not</u> use a cell phone as a calculator.)** Please turn off all electronic devices before entering the classroom. If your electronic device sounds, vibrates, or in any way disturbs the class, you will be asked to leave and considered absent for that day. This includes test days and you will <u>not</u> be allowed to make up the test!

Grading Criteria: Your final grade will be determined by the average numerical score for your test grades adjusted by homework as explained below. There will be a cumulative final exam. The course components will be weighted as follows:

Tests and/or the final exam (4 at 25% each) 100%

The homework for the course is usually completed using Connect. The homework should be submitted following completion of the chapter by the dates shown in Connect. Connect will report to you and to me on your performance. Your homework grade for each segment of the course will be your opportunity to curve your own test scores. A

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homework score of 90-100 on that segment will add 10 points to that test score. A homework grade of 65-89 will add whatever your homework grade is divided by 20. A homework grade of less than 65 will have zero impact. Your homework score starts over at the beginning of each test period. If you miss one of the tests, your extra points from that test will NOT apply to another test or the final exam. Homework may include all assignments on the homework manager plus anything else that may be assigned and/or taken up in class. NO LATE HOMEWORK WILL BE ACCEPTED. It is your responsibility to "submit" your homework after you complete it. Also, on occasion there are glitches in the system, so don't wait until the last minute to turn in your homework.

Test dates will be confirmed one class period in advance. One test grade may be dropped. <u>There will be no make-up tests.</u> If you miss a test, the missed test will be considered your "drop grade" and you must take the cumulative final exam. All missed tests will be handled in this manner regardless of the reason for your absence. Only one grade may be "dropped".
