## Undergraduate Admission Procedures

Admission to FMU is on a rolling basis. Students are encouraged to apply early to take full advantage of financial assistance and scholarship deadlines. After all admission information is received, every effort will be made to notify applicants of their admission status within two weeks.

### Freshman students must submit:

- An application for admission with the application fee.

## Admissions Office Hours, Tours & Open Houses

There's no better way to find out about FMU than to visit our beautiful campus and meet the faculty and staff. The Admissions Office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 5 pm. Tours are offered Monday through Friday at 10:30 am and 2 pm and on select Saturdays by appointment. Please call 843-661-1231 or 1-800-368-7551 to schedule a tour.

Open Houses are scheduled for Saturday, October 14, 2017, and Saturday, November 11, 2017. Please call the Admissions Office for more information.

- Official transcripts of high school work—You need 19 units of high school core courses to be admitted (4 units of English; 4 units of math; 3 units of laboratory science; 2 units of same foreign language; 3 units of social studies, including 1 unit of U.S. History; 1 unit of physical education or ROTC; 1 unit of fine arts, and 1 academic elective). In evaluating an application for admission, the university will consider high school record, SAT or ACT scores, recommendations and extracurricular activities.
- Official score report from the SAT or the ACT Program. For SAT and ACT test dates, contact the FMU Office of Admissions, your high school guidance office or the College Board. FMU offers an Institutional SAT (ISAT) or ACT by appointment. Call for details.

**Transfer Students**—Applicants with fewer than 22 transferable college credit hours must submit the information required for freshman applicants (see above) as well as official college transcripts. Students with 22 or more transferable college credit hours should submit official transcripts from all colleges attended and an application for admission along with the application fee.

**Transient Students** – If you are planning to apply credits earned at FMU to a degree at another institution, you must complete the application for admission. The dean or registrar of the institution to which credits are to be transferred must approve the courses that are to be taken at FMU. You will not be allowed to register as a transient student until written approval from the institution to which credits are to be transferred has been received by the Office of Admissions at Francis Marion University.

**Readmits**—If you have previously attended FMU and were not enrolled during the previous regular semester, you should contact the Office of Admissions to reapply for admission.

**Second-Degree** – If you have previously earned a baccalaureate degree (unclassified students) and wish to take undergraduate courses at Francis Marion University, you should complete the undergraduate application for admission. Positive proof of graduation (a copy of diploma or a transcript stating completion of degree work) is required.

## Late Registration, Drop-Add

If you miss registration, you may register late for the Late Spring semester on Tuesday, May 9; Summer I on Tuesday, May 30 or Wednesday, May 31; and Summer II on Monday, July 10, or Tuesday, July 11. A late fee is charged. You must confirm your class schedule by paying your balance due or by applying your financial assistance on the day you register through the Cashier's website or the Cashier's Office.

### Drop-Add

If you want to drop or add a course, you must see your academic adviser for approval. Changes in your schedule may then be made in your adviser's office or via [www.fmarion.edu](http://www.fmarion.edu). If you have a change in the number of credit hours, see the Cashier's Office and/or the Financial Assistance Office.

## Fee Payment

### How do I receive my bill?

Once you have registered for a summer semester, you may view and/or print your bill from our web site ([www.fmarion.edu/about/accounting](http://www.fmarion.edu/about/accounting)) or you may obtain a copy from the Cashier's Office. A BILL WILL NOT BE MAILED.

We try to make bill payment easy by giving you several options for payment.

**Mail-In:** You can mail a copy of the bill with a check or money order to the Cashier's Office.

**Walk-In:** You can bring the bill, along with your payment, to the Cashier's Office during normal working hours. The Cashier's Office is located in the Stokes Administration Building, room 104. Checks must be made payable to Francis Marion University.

**Web:** You can go to the Accounting/Cashier's web page at [www.fmarion.edu/about/accounting](http://www.fmarion.edu/about/accounting). Click on Pay Fees/Apply Aid. If you have financial assistance to cover all charges, you need only to apply your aid. If you owe a balance, you may pay with VISA, MC, American Express, Discover or E-Check.

#### • Vehicle Registration \$10.00

You will need the vehicle make, model and license tag number to complete the registration. Once processed, it generally takes 5-10 days to receive your decal in the mail, or you may check in the Cashier's Office after the start of classes.

#### • Debit Plan \$5.00 minimum

The amount of funds you designate will be placed in a declining balance account with your dining service provider. You will access these funds with your FMU card.

To ensure that your class schedule is not canceled, payment must be received in the Cashier's Office by the payment deadline.

**NOTE:** If you have enough available financial assistance to pay all of your University charges, your available aid will automatically be used to confirm your classes for the semester. An email will be sent to your FMU gmail account to notify you that your aid was used to confirm your classes. Please review your student account at [www.fmarion.edu/about/accounting](http://www.fmarion.edu/about/accounting) for a complete listing of your financial transactions. If you decide later that you will not be attending FMU for the semester, you must notify the Registrar's Office to withdraw you from your classes.

Complete your financial assistance requirements and the housing application process as soon as possible.

Routinely check your FMU gmail account. We use this account to communicate with you about your student account, registration, change checks, refund checks, upcoming deadlines, etc.

Once your fees have been paid, whether with your funds or financial assistance, your class schedule will be updated to confirmed status. You can verify your class status at [www.fmarion.edu/about/accounting](http://www.fmarion.edu/about/accounting). Click on Review and Print Class Schedule. You will need your FMU user ID and password to access this information.

## Refunds

General University Fees are refundable for full-time and part-time students according to the following schedule:

An administrative fee equal to five percent of the total fees charged for the semester or \$100.00, whichever is less, will be withheld from the refund after the 100 percent refund period.

Refunds are computed from the date of official withdrawal from the University. No refunds are made for full-time students dropping courses and not withdrawing from the University, unless by dropping courses a student's enrollment status drops below 10 hours. Fees are refundable for part-time students officially dropping courses without withdrawing from the University according to the following schedule:

Certain fees are non-refundable and are so noted. The Housing and Dining Refund Policy can be viewed on the web at [www.fmarion.edu/about/fees](http://www.fmarion.edu/about/fees). For information on the FMU ID card as the FMU Debit/Patriot card, refer to the student usage agreement at [www.fmarion.edu/about/fees](http://www.fmarion.edu/about/fees).

Because of requirements associated with the return of federal student aid funds, students who receive federal financial assistance and completely withdraw from the University may be required to repay an appropriate amount of the assistance to the University.

Refund checks are held in the Cashier's Office for 10 days and are then forwarded to the student's permanent home address.

Circumstances may warrant the assessment of a reinstatement fee for the purpose of academic reinstatement.

An appeals process exists for students or parents who believe that individual circumstances warrant exceptions from published policy.

Appeals must be in writing and are processed by the University's Withdrawal Appeals Committee. Address appeals to the Withdrawal Appeals Committee, Office of the Registrar, Francis Marion University, PO Box 100547 Florence, SC 29502-0547.

Refund Requests: All requests for refunds must be made during the academic year for which the fees were paid. The academic year begins with Summer II term and ends with the Summer I term. The decision of the Withdrawal Appeals Committee is final.

### FMU ID Card (University Debit Account)

Lost cards should be reported immediately to the FMU Card Administrator, located in the Ervin Dining Hall (Ext. 1266); Library (Ext 1300); Student Affairs (Ext. 1182); or Cashier's Office (Ext.1120) since this card may carry the liability of a bank debit card and is not transferable. Late charge (after initial registration) or replacement cost is \$19, which is nonrefundable. The fee will be waived in the case of marriage, a name change, or a defective card. A refund of funds placed on the FMU ID Card (debit account) may only be requested upon graduation or official withdrawal from the University. Requests should be submitted to the Dining Services Office in the Ervin Dining Hall.

### Parking Permits

All students are allowed to have a vehicle on campus. You must register the vehicle and purchase a parking decal. Decals run from fall to fall. Even if you purchase a decal in the spring semester, you must purchase a new one in the fall of each year. Vehicles may be registered in the Cashier's Office during the semester. If you live on campus, you must have a Residential parking decal, designated with an R, which will allow you to park in housing area lots. You should obtain the university Traffic Regulations Manual from the Cashier's Office, Campus Police, or you can access the manual on the web at <http://www.fmarion.edu/about/fmutrafficregulation>. This booklet contains important information about vehicle registration, parking, and traffic safety.

### Honors Courses

Honors courses are open to students with superior academic records by invitation only from the Honors Committee. For more information, contact Dr. Jon Tuttle, director of the Honors Program, at 843-661-1521.

### Grade Reports

At the end of each semester, grade reports will be made available to students at [www.fmarion.edu](http://www.fmarion.edu). Click "Swamp Fox for Students," then click "Review Grades." Call the Registrar's Office if you have questions about your grades.

### Withdrawal from a Course or the University

If you want to drop a course, you should obtain the necessary form from the Registrar's Office or in your academic department, complete the form, have it signed by the appropriate people, and then turn it into the Registrar's Office. Forms for complete withdrawal from the university are only available in the Registrar's Office.

### Class Attendance Policy

It is your responsibility to attend all scheduled meetings in the courses in which you are enrolled. If you are absent more than twice the number of required class or laboratory sessions per week during regular semesters or more than 15 percent of required sessions during accelerated semesters, a grade of F or W will normally be assigned, unless the instructor has excused the absences.

Individual instructors may choose alternative requirements for attendance. It is the instructor's responsibility to inform students, at the beginning of each course, of all attendance policies. The instructor, at his/her discretion, may utilize a warning of excessive absences or required attendance. Attendance policies will be outlined on the course syllabus.

It is your responsibility to understand at the beginning of each course the instructor's policy on missing classes, announced tests, and laboratory sessions. If you violate the stated attendance policy, the instructor will notify the Registrar's Office to drop you from the class with the appropriate grade.

laboratory sessions may be made up only at the discretion of the instructor.

### Disclosure of Directory Information

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974, as amended, permits the release of "directory information" about a student without a student's consent. FMU has designated the following items as directory information: student's name, enrollment status, address, FMU email, telephone listing, date and place of birth, photograph, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, most recent previous educational institution attended, and eligibility for honor societies.

Directory information may be published in a campus directory and other university publications and may be released to the mass media for publication (for example, Dean's List, President's List, commencement list, etc.). Students have the right to request that this information not be disclosed by completing a Request of Non-Disclosure form, available in the Registrar's Office, by the end of the drop/add period for each academic term. A request for non-disclosure prohibits the University from releasing the student's name and other information for purposes for which the student may wish to be recognized (for example, announcements of scholarship awards and other honors, notices of commencement exercises, induction into honor societies, participation in

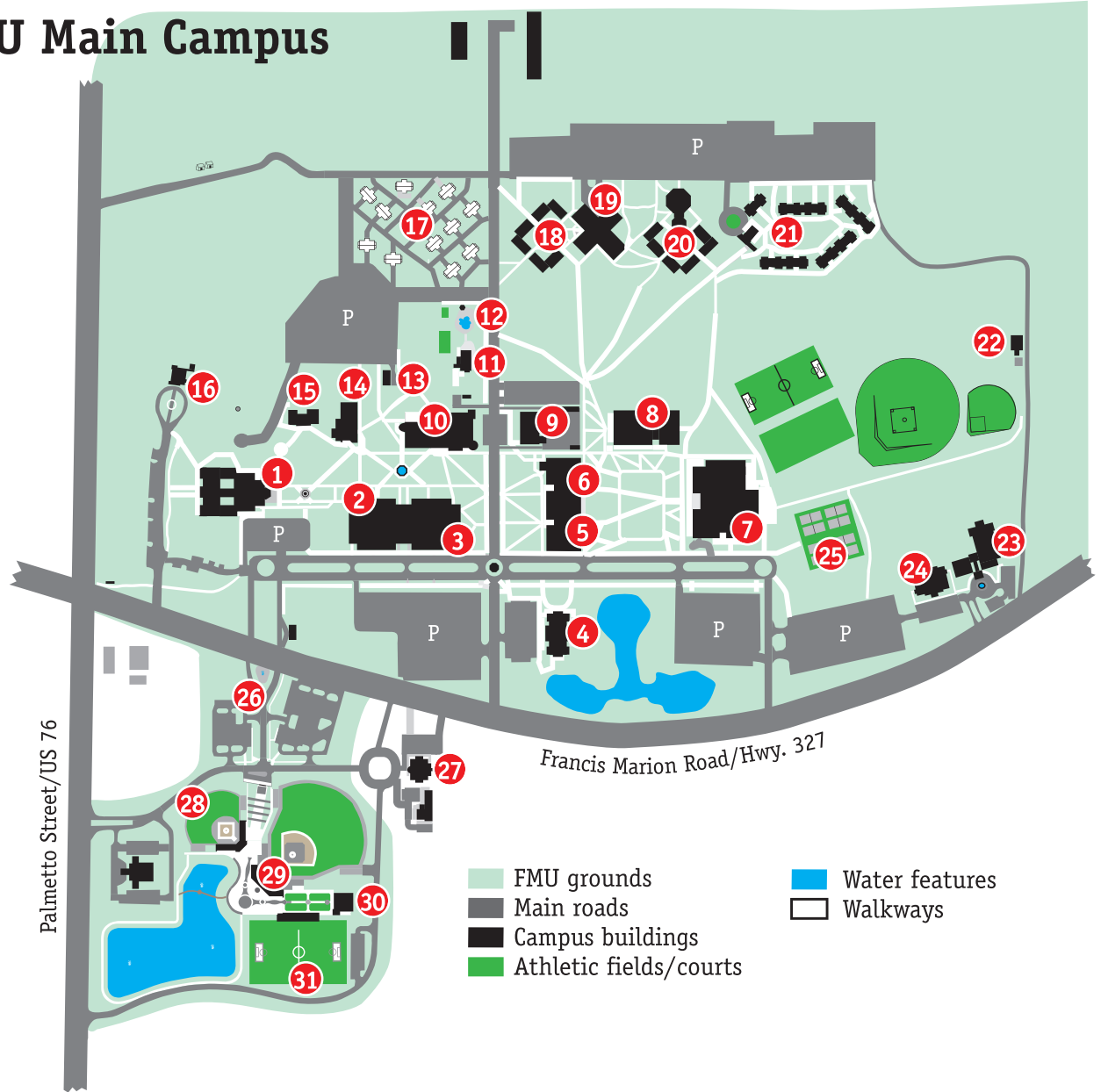

# Francis Marion University Campus Map

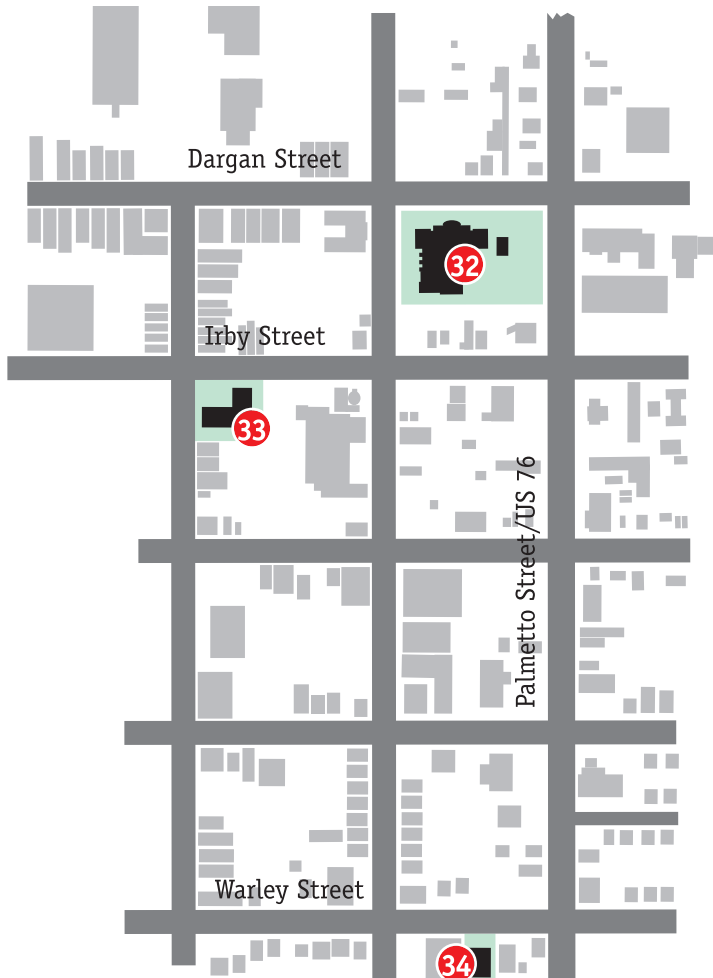

# LIFE AT FMU

A primer for students, and prospective students, at Francis Marion University.

## Athletics at FMU

Athletics are a big part of campus life at Francis Marion. The university fields teams in 14 NCAA sports, and the Patriots' work on and off the field is a source of pride to fellow students and alumni alike.

The "student-athlete" concept is no charade at Francis Marion. More than half the young men and women on Patriot team rosters are on the dean's list in any given semester, and athletes are often among the very best students in the respective majors. This approach makes sense for all concerned. Athletics remains in its proper place, as an extracurricular activity at the university, and the athletes benefit from a proper life focus.

The opportunity to perform professionally exists – witness the success of current Patriots like baseballer Josh Edgin of the New York Mets, or Evrik Gary, who is playing professional basketball in Europe) – but most are wise enough to spend their time preparing for a career beyond sports.

And the Patriots are plenty good on the field while they doing it. More than half of FMU's student-athletes make Dean's List each year, and student-athletes' cumulative GPA for the most recent semester was 2.96.

Every FMU team is a member of the NCAA's Peach Belt Conference, except for men's golf, which performs as an NCAA Division I independent. The Peach Belt, which features schools from the Carolinas, Georgia, Alabama and Florida, is recognized as one most competitive collegiate leagues in America. Teams from the 24-year-old league have appeared in 61 national finals and won 33 championships.

## Pearl of the Pee Dee

Francis Marion's long and storied athletic history includes the exploits of women's basketball star Pearl Moore. Pearl is a bonafied legend, a hall of famer who averaged better than 30 points per game for her career and is still the all-time leading scorer in women's college basketball.

FMU has won national titles in women's basketball (twice) and men's golf, and is a regular participant in all sports in post-season play.

## See the world

Researchers at the WildSumaco Biological Station, in the volcanic jungle wilds of northern Ecuador, have discovered, or on the verge of confirming discovery of, more than a dozen new animal species. Who are those researchers? Well, some of them are Francis Marion University students and faculty.



Unexpected experiences that marry up the excitement of travel with the wonder of learning, are standard operating procedure for FMU undergrads. Students in Biology (and many other fields) journey to WildSumaco; Political Science majors and their friends make annual trips to Washington, D.C. and New York; and students in every discipline travel abroad to a variety of destinations. Some are short trips, planned for spring break or a summer vacation. Others are semester-long exchange experiences, designed to immerse students in the culture of a foreign university. Exchange students benefit financially, too. Tuition doesn't change, even when a semester is spent in an exotic foreign locale.

## Scholarships & Financial Aid

In the past decade academic scholarship aid at Francis Marion has grown by 47 percent to almost \$9 million. Scholarships provided by the university and its many donors have grown even more. That giving is up by 79 percent.

What it means is an increasing number of options for FMU students and families as they seek the smartest, most efficient path to paying for a great college education.

Francis Marion students can choose from a wide variety of named scholarships aimed at students in particular disciplines or from particular backgrounds. Counselors in our admissions and financial aid offices can help families chart their course.

## The basics

The minimum criteria for all FMU scholarships includes admittance to the university for upcoming fall semester, a score of 1100 or better on the SAT (CR and Math only) or 24 ACT Composite, and a high school GPA of 3.0 or higher.

## Robert E. McNair Scholarship

FMU's prestigious Robert E. McNair Scholarship is named for former S.C. Governor Robert E. McNair, who was instrumental in launching a new four-year college in the Pee Dee that would be Francis Marion, back in the 1960s.

McNair Scholars must be residents of South Carolina and have an interest in pursuing a public service career, and they must survive a rigorous selection process that includes interviews, essay and on campus visits.

It is not easy road, but the payoff is significant. The McNair scholarship covers a student's full tuition, housing and meal plan. It also includes a book allowance and overseas experience. It is renewable each year, provided recipients maintain a 3.0 GPA and pass 30 credit hours of course work.

The McNair Scholarship application, including the required essays and two letters of recommendation, is due by November 1.

## Konduros Scholar

The James S. Konduros Scholarship awards \$6,000 for tuition and other expenses – combined with an S.C. LIFE scholarship, it can cover a year's tuition – and, like the McNair, can be renewed annually. Konduros scholars must maintain a 3.0 GPA and pass 30 credit hours per year. Selection is based on applications and interviews.

## Education Fellow

A \$5,000 scholarship can be awarded to Education majors who are part of the South Carolina Teacher Cadet Program. Preference is given to FMU-sponsored Teacher Cadets. For more on the teacher cadet program, go to <http://www.fmarion.edu/fmuadmissions/educationfellow>.

## FMU Fellows

Fellows scholars may receive annual awards of between \$1,500-\$2,500, renewable annually if recipients meet standard renewal qualifications. Scholarship awards are based on applications and interviews.

## Plenty of Help

Nearly 86 percent of our undergraduate students receive scholarships, need-based grants, loans, and student employment through the Office of Financial Assistance.

### Steps for web registration

- Meet with your academic adviser.  
Your academic adviser will approve you for web registration.
- Web registration will be available beginning March 22, 2017.  
Student access will be by classification as follows:  
Seniors may begin registering on March 22.  
Juniors may begin registering on March 24.  
Sophomores may begin registering on March 28.  
Freshmen may begin registering on March 30.
- Log in on the web to: www.fmarion.edu.
- Click on "Swamp Fox for Students." Click on "Register for Classes."
- Enter User Name – this will be your ID number.
- Enter Password – Your first password will be your birth month and birth date (two digits each).  
Examples: January 5 = 0105  
December 10 = 1210
- Click on OK.
- At this point if this is your first time using Swamp Fox, you must create a new four digit password. This is your password created and known only to you. So be sure to record it in a safe place. You will need this four digit password for all future transactions. REMEMBER: This password will be known only by you and the Registrar's Office.
- Select the semester for which you wish to register, then click that semester.
- Once you have selected a semester, you are now ready to add or delete classes.
