Rational	

The committee's main responsibility is to advise and assist the Director of Institutional

Research and the Office of the Provost in matters related to program assessment. In this capacity, the committee reviews the annual Institutional Effectiveness Reports from departments, schools, and programs, and may collaborate with report authors to suggest revisions and to provide support and professional development. Due to the number of program and department reports (34 for 2017-18 academic year) and the expected increase in programs and departments, an increase in the number of committee members from 6 to 10 is necessary to fulfill the committee's responsibilities.

- 1. Proposal from the Department of English, Modern Languages, and Philosophy
 - A. **MODIFY** requirements for a minor in Philosophy and Religious Studies (Catalog, p. 83).

FROM:

A minor in philosophy and religious studies requires 18 semester hours in philosophy and religious studies (six courses designated Philosophy and Religious Studies, at least two courses of which must be at the 300 level or higher) and must include Philosophy and Religious Studies 201, 202, 203, and either 204 or 205.

RATIONALE:

We have tried this for a while, and while students focused on philosophy benefit from taking PRS 203 (Symbolic Logic), the requirement appears to have the consequence of dissuading students from pursuing the minor, especially students whose focus is primarily religious studies.

RATIONALE:

The current titles of these two courses presuppose an exclusively Christian perspective on the canon that Christians call the Bible. This change brings our nomenclature in line with current standards, and is neutral from the standpoint of any particular religious belief.

2. Proposal from the School of Education

A. DELETE from page 149 of the current course catalog the following:

191 Preparation for Education Program Admission (1) (Corequisite: 190) F, S. Teacher candidate will receive their first clinical experiences in this course. This course is required of all candidates seeking licensure, including transfer students. This course provides the experiences and knowledge base necessary for successful progress in any FMU School of Education program. Included will be orientation to LiveText and other technologies used in the School of Education, introduction to state and federal mandates impacting teacher candidates, orientation to teaching in diverse settings and/ or with diverse students, required state examinations, expected professional dispositions, and relevant School of Education policies and procedures. This course requires a minimum of 25 hours in clinical experience in a local public school setting. To complete the field experience hours, a current SLED background check must be received and approved by the FMU School of Education. Students should check the "News and Announcements" webpage for specific SLED background check deadlines: www.fmarion.edu/education/ soenews/. The purchase of LiveText is a course requirement. Students who have SC Teacher Cadet credit are required to take this course but are exempt from the clinical requirements.

RATIONALE:

The EDUC 191 course currently requires 25 hours of field experience and is taken second semester of freshman year. We have found that requiring field experience hours so early

in a student's college career may limit some students from being able to attend field experience due to lack of transportation or understanding of the full requirements. Additionally, students have asked for more field experience hours in courses where they are able to practice teaching rather than observing as the 191 course requires.

B. **MODIFY** on page 150 of the current catalog the following:

FROM:

313 Field Experiences in Instructional Planning and Assessment (1) (Prerequisite: Admission to Professional Education Program; Prerequisite: Education 311) F, S. This field experience in the Professional Education Program requires students to spend extensive time during the semester in the public schools observing and gathering data related to instructional planning and assessment, teaching strategies, diversity, and classroom management. In addition, bimonthly seminars will be held on campus for reflection and discussion. This course requires a minimum of 35 hours in clinical experience in public schools. A SLED background check is required prior to field placement.

<u>TO:</u>

313 Field Experiences in Instructional Planning and Assessment (2) (Prerequisite: Admission to Professional Education Program; Prerequisite: Education 311) F, S. This field experience in the Professional Education Program requires students to spend extensive time during the semester in the public schools observing and gathering data related to instructional planning and assessment, teaching strategies, diversity, and classroom management. In addition, bimonthly seminars will be held on campus for reflection and discussion. This course requires a minimum of 50 hours in clinical experience in public schools. A SLED background check is required prior to field placement.

RATIONALE:

In order to meet state requirements, students must complete a total of 100 hours of field/clinical experience prior to the student teaching block. With the elimination of EDUC 191, the 25 hours of field/clinical experience need to be redistributed to other courses that also require field experience hours. EDUC 313 currently requires 35 hours of field experience. This change will increase the required field/clinical experience hours to 50 to allow students more time to gain teaching experience through practice in the field. As this increases the coursework for the students, the credit hour from the eliminated EDUC 191 course was added to EDUC 313 to bring the total credit hours for the course to 2.

C. **MODIFY** on page 145 under "Major" the following:

After meeting the requirements specified below, students are accepted and must complete the graduation requirements for the selected program. Admission to the professional education program is a prerequisite for enrollment in any education course beyond EDUC 305: Early Childhood Education (ECE), Elementary Education (ELE), Middle Level Education (MLE), and Education (EDUC).

Students advance from Pre-Education to Education in the School upon meeting the following requirements:

- 1. Completion of Education 190/191 and Education 305 with a grade of C or better.
- 2. A cumulative grade point average of at least 2.75 in all undergraduate courses taken at FMU.
- 3. A passing score, as determined by South Carolina, on the selected state-approved tests in mathematics, writing, and reading. A passing score on these examinations is a requirement for admission to any courses above Education 305 and the Professional Education Program.
- 4. Positive recommendations from the field (public school personnel).
- 5. Completion of at least 45 semester hours.

TO:

Students seeking an Education degree enter as Pre-Education students in one of the seven majors (Early Childhood, Elementary, Middle, PreK-12Art, Secondary Biology, Secondary History, Secondary English, or Secondary Math). After meeting the requirements specified below, students are accepted and must complete the graduation requirements for the selected program. Admission to the professional education program is a prerequisite for enrollment in any education course beyond EDUC 305: Early Childhood Education (ECE), Elementary Education (ELE), Middle Level Education (MLE), and Education (EDUC).

Students advance from Pre-Education to Education in the School upon meeting the following requirements:

- 1. Completion of Education 190 and Education 305 with a grade of C or better.
- 2. A cumulative grade point average of at least 2.75 in all undergraduate courses taken at FMU.
- 3. A passing score, as determined by South Carolina, on the selected state-approved tests in mathematics, writing, and reading. A passing score on these examinations is a requirement for admission to any courses above Education 305 and the Professional Education Program.

- 4. Positive recommendations from the field (public school personnel).
- 5. Completion of at least 45 semester hours.

With the elimination of EDUC 191, this modification eliminates the course from the list of requirements that is needed for a student to advance from Pre-Education to Education.
