Director's Statement: How do we as human animals make decisions? Most of us are inclined towards either emotional or logical points of view. However, when those perspectives become more important than the criteria or decisions, OR if we rely on others to dictate decisions to us and we follow blindly, OR we do nothing...effective solutions rarely emerge.

Theatre of the Absurd: dramatic works of certain European and American dramatists of the 1950s and early '60s who agreed with philosopher Albert Camus's assessment, in his essay "The Myth of Sisyphus" (1942), that the human situation is essentially absurd, devoid of purpose...dramatists as diverse as Samuel Beckett, Eugène Ionesco, Jean Genet, and Harold Pinter... shared a pessimistic vision of humanity struggling vainly to find a purpose and to control its fate. *-Britannica*

...Camus takes the skeptical position that the natural world, the universe, and the human enterprise remains silent about any such purpose [life's purpose]. Since existence itself has no meaning, we must learn to bear an irresolvable emptiness. This paradoxical situation, then, between our impulse to ask ultimate questions and the impossibility of achieving any adequate answer, is what Camus calls the absurd. Camus's philosophy of the absurd explores the consequences arising from this basic paradox.
