The Board of Trustees for Francis Marion University is composed of the Governor of the State or his designee, who is an *ex officio* member of the board, and sixteen members, with fifteen of these members to be elected by the General Assembly and one member to be appointed from the State at large by the Governor. The General Assembly elects and the Governor appoints these members based on merit regardless of race, color, creed, or gender and strives to assure that the membership of the board is representative of all citizens of the state of South Carolina.

Of the fifteen members to be elected, one member must be elected from each congressional district and the remaining eight members must be elected by the General Assembly from the State at large. None of the Trustees are employed by the University and none have any contractual, or personal or familial financial interest. All elected members serve four-year terms.

Founded as a state college in 1970, Francis Marion University adheres to the primary purpose of its establishment: to make available to people of all ages and origins an excellent baccalaureate education in the liberal arts and selected professional programs in business, education, and nursing. Professional graduate programs at the master's level are also offered in business, education, and psychology.

The University seeks to provide students with a foundation for lifelong learning and to help them develop skills for professional careers in business, industry, government, public service,

and education as well as for more advanced study in professional and graduate schools. To that end, we place major emphasis on the quality of our faculty, staff, library, and educational support services. Student involvement in the faculty's ongoing scholarly pursuits are encouraged and supported.

Remaining true to the founding, the University primarily serves in-state students with its highest concentration from the Pee Dee regions of the state (northeastern SC). The University is located near the growing community of Florence, SC. The University has an unusually extensive general education curriculum which includes 12 hours in the laboratory sciences.

The University has a very diverse student body due to its inclusive admissions policy which uses both admission test scores and high school performance in determining admission status. Our in-state peers are Lander University, Coastal Carolina University, the Citadel and the Aiken, Upstate and Beaufort colleges of the University of SC.

Dear Dr. Carter:

The Francis Marion University Physician Assistant Program was previously placed on Accreditation-Probation status by the Accreditation Review Commission on Education for the Physician Assistant (ARC-PA). After review at the March 2017 commission meeting, the program's accreditation status remains Accreditation-Probation.

The program's status will remain Accreditation-Probation until the Provisional Monitoring visit. As such, the program is prohibited from admitting a cohort of students until approved by the ARC-PA. The Program report due (as outlined in the attached citation document) will be reviewed by the commission at the September 2017 meeting. The program's ability to admit a cohort of students in 2018 will be determined at the September 2017 commission meeting.

The basis for the decision was the information contained in the program's follow up report and its accreditation history.

At the time of the focused site visit, the commission determined the program was making positive strides toward compliance with standards A1.03a, A2.09d and C1.01, while others remain deficient. The site visit revealed evidence of strong institutional support throughout administration. Throughout each meeting with the institutional officials (Dean, Provost, Director of Institutional Effectiveness, the SAC-COC Coordinator and the SACS-COC Liaison Officer), each official expressed a personal and institutional commitment to the making the program successful. Both the dean and the provost took responsibility for shortcomings in supervision and oversight of the previous program director. The dean discussed the ongoing collaboration that is now in place and the progress the interim program director has made. During site visit discussions, the medical director and the dean both acknowledged the previous deficiencies in the program's self-assessment process.

Since the last site visit, the program has developed a comprehensive plan to collect and analyze data to promote program effectiveness and self-assessment. Although didactic objectives have been revised, the clinical year syllabi and objectives need further improvement. Site visitors determined that with the start of the new semester (January 2017), students will obtain syllabi that will guide student acquisition of required competencies and allow assessment of student learning.

The ARC-PA noted six (6) areas of noncompliance with the *Standards* presented as citations in the enclosed document. The Citations document includes information on reports due to the ARC-PA.

The *Provisional Monitoring* review of the program by the ARC-PA is scheduled for the March 2019 commission meeting. The program will be contacted by the ARC-PA in advance of that review regarding details of the application, reports and selecting site visit dates.
