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

University Life 100: First-Year Seminar (FYS)

If you are a new freshman, you will be enrolled in First–Year Seminar during your first semester at FMU. We want you to have a successful start, and FYS helps to ensure that you are prepared by giving you a place to learn more about the University and ask questions throughout the semester.

Academics

We want your time at Francis Marion to be successful. During Orientation, we will review the academic standards of the University and how you can be successful. The University offers free academic services through the Center for Academic Success and Advisement's: Writing Center, Tutoring Center, First Year Advising and Office of Career Development. In addition, you will have access to several computer labs on campus, the Cauthen Educational Media Center, and Rogers Library.

Financial Assistance

We know that applying for financial assistance can be stressful. The first step is to complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Once the Office of Financial Assistance receives this, you will receive a letter notifying you of your award. To learn more about what types of aid are offered, visit the Financial Assistance website at fmarion.edu/financialassistance. Financial aid representatives are also available to answer questions and provide guidance during Orientation.

Registering for Classes

You will register for classes for the upcoming semester with an academic advisor during Orientation.

Campus Life

Francis Marion has an active, diverse student population that seeks to get the most out of the college experience. As a result, you have the option to participate in a large number of student organizations and events on campus. Student Organizations are open to both residential and commuter students.

Housing

FMU offers residence halls, villas, and apartments for convenient on–campus housing. If you have not yet signed up for on–campus housing, it isn't too late. Many students find living on campus to be the most convenient option, especially when just beginning college. If you have already signed up for housing or want to sign up for it, a representative from the Housing Office will be available during Orientation to speak with you and guide you through the process.

Campus Safety

Safety is a top priority at FMU. The University has an on–site police force who patrols at all hours. There are emergency call boxes located around the campus, as well as resident assistants within residence halls and apartments.

Study Abroad

Francis Marion has a number of short-term and long-term study abroad opportunities for students. These opportunities provide a wonderful way for you to gain valuable experience outside of the classroom while traveling to countries like England, Germany, France, Canada, Ireland and more.

Student Health

Student health is important to us. Located in the Education Foundation Building beside the Griffin Athletic Complex, the student health clinic and counseling center offer free services to FMU students. In addition, students have access to the pool and fitness center located in the University Center.

FMU Catalog

The Catalog for the year that you enter the University will be your guide until you graduate. The Catalog contains information on majors, courses, campus resources, and other valuable pieces of information that you will need.

I am transferring from a South Carolina Technical College. What classes will I be able to transfer into FMU?

If you are transferring from a South Carolina Technical College, review the rules regarding transfer credit as well as the transfer guide online at bit.ly/TransferGuide18 to see what courses will transfer.

Transferring Credit from Other Institutions

Official transcripts of students transferring from another institution are evaluated in the Registrar's Office, and the results are provided to you in the Patriot Portal. The applicability of transferred credits to major requirements is determined by the Registrar's Office.

FIRST YEAR COMPOSITION

All students at Francis Marion must fulfill the university writing requirement by successfully completing our firstyear composition sequence:

- ENG 101 or ENG 101E/101L
- ENG 102

Composition courses at FMU are capped at 15 students per section. This small class size allows for more teacher student interaction, stronger writing communities, and engaged learning experiences - ones that we hope students will recall throughout their years at FMU.

How do I know what composition course is right for me?

All incoming students should enroll in either ENG 101 (Analysis and Argument) or ENG 101E/101L (Analysis and Argument with Extended Studio) unless you have college credit from dual enrollment, AP credit, or transfer credit. If you select ENG 101E, then be sure to enroll in its corresponding ENG 101L studio counterpart. After successfully completing ENG 101 or ENG 101E/101L, students will enroll in ENG 102. Note that a grade of C or higher must be obtained in composition courses to satisfy graduation requirements. For more information, go to http://bit.ly/FMUeng.


How do I decide between ENG 101 or ENG 101E/ENG 101L?

Students should consider the level of instructional support they prefer. To do so, follow these steps:

What is the difference between ENG 101 and ENG 101E/ENG 101L?

While the two have the same goals, the main difference is the course structure. ENG 101E is an "extended" version of ENG 101 and is paired with a writing studio called ENG 101L (an elective studio/lab hour that is assessed on a Satisfactory or Unsatisfactory level). The goal of the ENG 101L studio is to offer students more time for writing practice, more assistance with writing, and more guidance with revision. This extra instructional time better prepares students for success in and beyond their composition courses.

What is Financial Assistance?

Financial assistance is available in the form of grants, scholarships, loans, and a work–study program.

The first step in the financial assistance application process is completion of the FAFSA. The FAFSA collects information that will be analyzed for use by Francis Marion University's Office of Financial Assistance to determine the types of assistance for which you qualify. It is highly recommended that you and your parent(s) apply for a FSA ID before completing your FAFSA. FMU's Title IV School Code is 009226.

FAFSA allows you to enter the FAFSA information into the program and transmit the information directly to the U.S. Department of Education. You and your parents will sign the FAFSA with the FSA ID. If you or your parent do not have a FSA ID, save your FAFSA and complete the FSA ID application. Once you and your parents receive your FSA ID, go back into your saved FAFSA and sign with the FSA IDs. Signing with FSA IDs saves 2 – 3 weeks processing time.

The FAFSA must be completed for every academic year that you want assistance. Each academic year begins in the fall and ends in the summer.

What happens after the FAFSA is completed?

Once the FAFSA is completed online and signed with a Personal Identification Number (PIN), you should receive an email from the U.S. Department of Education within one week. The Office of Financial Assistance will typically receive the results of the FAFSA within 7 business days. You will either receive a request for additional paperwork or an award notice within approximately 14 business days of submission of the online FAFSA. Return completed paperwork as quickly as possible to the Office of Financial Assistance.

If no information from the Department of Education or from the Office of Financial Assistance is received within the above–mentioned time frames, go to www.fafsa.ed.gov or call 1–800–433–3243.

Is Loan Entrance Counseling required?

If you are considering a loan at any point while attending FMU, you will need to complete loan entrance counseling* online which is a Federal requirement. You will only need to complete this interview once while attending FMU.

*Loan Entrance Counseling is not an application for a loan and does not obligate students in any way to accept a loan.

Is there an application for the LIFE or HOPE scholarship?

No, there is not an application for these scholarships. If you are eligible for either the LIFE or HOPE scholarship, you will receive an award notice and certification form within 3–4 weeks after acceptance to the University. You should contact the Office of Financial Assistance if no notification has been received within 3–4 weeks of acceptance and you believe that you are eligible.

How is financial aid applied to fees?

Once financial assistance has been awarded and all requirements have been met, financial assistance can be used to pay tuition and fees. If there is enough assistance to cover tuition and fees, assistance will automatically be applied to the student account. An email will be sent to you at your FMU Gmail account to confirm this transaction.

If there is not enough available assistance to pay all tuition and fees, you must pay the remaining balance out of personal funds. To help manage payments, you may sign—up for the Patriot Portal. Once payment for the complete balance or the payment plan application and first payment are received, they will be applied to the account and posted on financial assistance. The payment deadline for the Fall semester is August 7.

What if there is not enough aid to cover fees?

What is a Change Check?

A change check is a check for any excess funds in the account after the bill has been paid in full. You will receive an email in your FMU Gmail account when a change check or refund check is available. Instead of receiving a paper check, you will sign—up for direct deposit into a checking or savings account. Direct Deposit forms can be found online at fmarion.edu/accounting

Free Application For Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) for 2019–2020

- Go to Financial Assistance
- www.fmarion.edu/financialassistance
- The following items will be needed to complete the FAFSA:
 - 2017 W-2 forms (parent and student)
 - 2017 Federal tax returns (parent and student)
 - Records of untaxed income such as TANF,
 Social Security, etc.
- Keep copies of all documents in a folder in case you are selected for verification.
- The FAFSA has to be completed each academic year. Rule of thumb: when you complete your taxes, file your FAFSA.

Personal Identification Number (Pin)

- If a PIN from the <u>FMU website</u> has not been requested,
 - go to Financial Assistance to select one.
- PINs are used in place of signatures on FAFSAs, promissory notes, etc.
- Using PINs in place of signatures reduces the processing of the FAFSA by as much as 3 - 4 weeks!

STATE SCHOLARSHIPS

All state scholarship recipients must be S.C. residents at the time of high school graduation. Criteria and funding for these scholarships are subject to change. Although every effort is made to update FMU's Office of Financial Assistance website as changes occur, the most up–to–date information is available at www.che.sc.gov.

Palmetto Fellows:

- Palmetto Fellows = \$6700 1st year, \$7500 2nd, 3rd & 4th years
- Application submitted to the Commission on Higher Education (CHE) during high school
- FMU notified of eligible recipients by CHE
- To renew scholarship:
 - Must earn 30 hours per year (Fall, Spring and Summer)
 - Must maintain a 3.0 cumulative FMU GPA

Important:

Initial awards are made upon tentative acceptance to FMU. Eligibility may change when final transcripts are received by FMU.

LIFE Scholarship:

- LIFE = \$5000 per year
- No application is required for the LIFE Scholarship. Once accepted to FMU, transcript data will be evaluated for LIFE Scholarship eligibility.
- New freshmen must meet two of the following three requirements to be eligible for the LIFE Scholarship:
 - 3.0 high school GPA based on Uniform Grading Scale
 - Have a combined Pre–March 2016 SAT Score (Critical Reading and Math) of 1100 or higher; combined New SAT Score (Evidence Based Reading & Writing and Math) of 1160 or higher; or a 24 or higher ACT Score
 - Rank in top 30% of high school graduating class
 - *Cannot be eligible for Palmetto Fellows.
- The chart below outlines the guidelines that must be met in order to renew LIFE Scholarship.

HOPE Scholarship:

- HOPE = \$2800 per year
- No application is required for the HOPE Scholarship. Once accepted to FMU, the high school transcript data will be evaluated for HOPE Scholarship eligibility.
- To be eligible for a HOPE Scholarship, a student must be a first-time freshman and have a 3.0 high school GPA based on Uniform Grading Scale.
 - *Cannot be eligible for Palmetto Fellows or LIFE.
- The HOPE Scholarship does NOT renew. Students must gain eligibility for the LIFE Scholarship or they will be ineligible for state scholarship funds.

Enhancement Scholarship:

- Enhancement = \$2500 per year (available 2nd, 3rd & 4th years only)
- Available for the 2nd, 3rd and 4th years of college;
- Not available to 1st year students
- Must be Palmetto Fellows or LIFE eligible
- Must be enrolled in and making progress toward a math or science major approved by CHE. A list of approved majors are available on the <u>CHE website</u>.
- Must have earned 14 hours of CHE approved math and science courses by the end of the first year of college.
- *As of today, all math, computer science and science courses (biology,

RESIDENCE LIFE

Have questions? Call the Housing Office at 843–661–1330. The Housing and Residence Life program promotes academic success by providing modern, attractive facilities in a safe environment. A residence hall or university apartment is more than just a place for sleeping and storing books. It becomes the student's home, the place they will spend most of their time studying, socializing, and living.

There are several options available to students who live on campus.

Residence Halls

While all full-time FMU students are eligible to live in the Residence Halls, these buildings are designed to meet the needs of freshmen and sophomore students. Every residence hall floor is secured by an electronic "Intelli-Key" built into FMU student IDs, which allows only residents of that floor to enter. A Resident Assistant is assigned to every floor to serve as a resource for students, providing information, oversight and activities for the residents.

The Village Apartments

The complex consists of 12 two-story apartment buildings accommodating 386 residents. Residing in the Village Apartments provides upperclassmen a higher level of independence and less oversight than the residence halls. As you successfully progress through your college career, you may choose campus apartment living.

The Forest Villas

The Forest Villas are designed for our graduate and upperclassmen. Assignments to The Forest Villas are made with priority order given to graduate students, seniors, juniors and sophomores. Primarily made up of four-bedroom apartments, the apartment suites contain a shared kitchen with appliances, adjoining living room and two full bathrooms.

Campus housing options come furnished with a bed, dresser and desk with chair.



How do you apply for on-campus housing?

How much is on-campus housing?

Can roommate requests be made?

Yes, you may request a specific roommate on the housing application. In order for it to be considered, both you and your desired roommate will have to request to be roommates. The Housing Office will do its best to accommodate specific roommate requests, although it cannot guarantee that a request will be honored.

What options are there for on-campus housing?

FMU offers several options when it comes to on-campus housing including residence halls, the Village Apartments, and the Forest Villas. New freshmen and those with less than 24 hours of college credit live in the residence halls. The apartments and villas are reserved for upperclassmen.

What are the benefits to living on-campus?

There are many benefits to living on campus. Some of these benefits include proximity to classes and academic resources, as well as financial considerations. You will not have the added concern of having to pay a monthly rent bill or utility fees. It also provides you with a better chance to get involved on campus and become a part of the campus community.

The Center for Academic Success and Advisement (CASA) offers students a one–stop resource for assistance with advising questions, academic support, and career services.

CASA is home to Advisement, the Career Development Office, the Tutoring Center, as well as the Writing Center (located downstairs in FH 114–C). CASA provides a variety of services designed to help students thrive during their experience at Francis Marion University.

CASA also works in conjunction with University Life 100: First–Year Seminar, providing first–year students with valuable information to help them become acquainted with the university, build connections on campus, learn about strategies for being successful students, and make the most of their time at FMU.

CASA is also home to the Patriot Mentor program, a staff of undergraduate peer mentors who work with new students in First–Year Seminar courses.

All of these resources provide students with a network of knowledgeable and friendly professionals who can help with questions they may have while at the university.

CASA advisors work closely with first–year students to ease the transition from high school to university life. The friendly and knowledgeable advising team assists first–year students in navigating the university, choosing majors, finding career paths, selecting courses, and exercising habits that lead to academic success. CASA advisors are dedicated to supporting students and connecting them to resources that will help them be successful during their academic careers at FMU.

CASA advisors also provide academic counseling for probationary students and answer general questions for students about course registration, majors and minors, study skills, time management, career guidance, and more.

Career Development Office

The Career Development Office, located in CASA, provides a comprehensive, educational approach to career development and preparation. Career services and programs are available for all FMU students and alumni.

Students are encouraged to begin using the Career Development Office during their first year of enrollment. Staff members are available to meet with students exploring their skills and interests as they decide upon their majors and plans for specific career fields.

The Career Development Office also provides links for students pursuing employment opportunities through employer visits and a resume referral service available to students and alumni. Career guidance workshops allow students to explore occupations, research employers, and develop the skills needed to conduct successful job searches. Mock interviews are also available for student job seekers.

The Career Development Office also holds a job fair each fall and spring semester, connecting students and alumni with a variety of employers. Full–time, part–time, and summer job ads and internships for on–campus and off–campus positions are regularly posted outside the Career Development Office (FH 220) and on Career Development's social media pages. The Career Development staff also offer information sessions and one–on–one meetings for students considering graduate or pre–professional programs of study.

Campus Technology

Stanton Academic Computer Center • 843–661–1335 Campus Technology oversees the computer labs

Campus Technology oversees the computer labs across campus, provides students with an FMU email account, offers a help desk to assist with computer or network issues, and provides networked dorms and wireless hot spots across campus.

Counseling & Testing

The Counseling and Testing Center offers personal counseling, disability accommodations, and testing services.

Library Services

The library offers a variety of web-based databases and catalogs, over 10 million book volumes, and twenty individual group and study rooms. Wireless internet as well as a computer lab is provided in the library.

Media Services

Recreational Facilities

The Smith University Center houses a number of campus offices as well as recreational facilities including a gymnasium with four practice basketball courts, an eight–lane varsity swimming pool with three diving boards, sauna, four racquetball/handball courts, game area (pool tables, ping–pong tables, and foosball), fitness room with weights and exercise machines, locker rooms, and much more.

Student Health Services

Education Foundation Building • 843–661–1844 Student Health Services provides healthcare, health education, and referral services to students when needed. No fees are charged for on–campus services; however, modest fees are charged for off– site laboratory testing. Fees for referral provider visits are the responsibility of the student receiving care.

Tutoring Center

The FMU Tutoring Center provides all students with learning assistance for a variety of subjects, including math, sciences, social sciences, and humanities courses. Located in CASA (Founders Hall 220), the Tutoring Center is staffed by faculty members and trained peer tutors. Students are welcome to meet with tutors to review course content, practice problem–solving skills, and discuss study strategies.

Writing Center

Students are invited to meet with a consultant at any stage of the writing process for guidance.

INTRODUCING THE PATRIOT PORTAL

The path to becoming an FMU student and a member of the Patriot community starts with the Patriot Portal.

The Patriot Portal, a cloud-based space that provides secure access to important information for students, faculty and staff at Francis Marion University. The information available to each user is specific to that user. Faculty and staff will use the Portal to complete a number of tasks related to the business of the university, and to access information related to their employment.

For FMU students, the Patriot Portal provides you with access to information about financial aid, class registration, housing; links to commonly used FMU websites; and much more. Additional information, specific to you, will arrive through announcements and notices of coming events.

Students gain access to the Patriot Portal by using the existing username and password associated with their FMU G-mail account.

For security's sake, initial access to the Patriot Portal is a two-step process. Once complete, students can access both their FMU G-Mail account and the Patriot Portal using the same username and password.

Creating a Password for your Account

Create a password for your FMU G-mail account. An FMU G-mail address has been created for you. Refer to the Orientation Advising Form in your folder for your FMU G-mail address (example: john.smith@g.fmarion.edu)

- Go to the FMU Password Manager at http://bit.lv/FMUPassword
- Enter your FMU G-Mail user name (example: frank.fox). Note: Do not include "@g. fmarion.edu" for user name
- Follow the prompts, which will include answering a few personal questions to assist with validation
- Create a password, using FMU's rules for creating strong passwords:
 - · Must have a minimum of 8 characters.
 - Must contain lower case letters
 - Must contain at least one upper case character
 - · Must contain at least one number.
 - Must contain at least one special character (e.g.@#\$%)
- Once your password is complete and confirmed, proceed to the Portal.





HOW TO ADD A PROXY TO YOUR ACCOUNT


1. Under the Select a Proxy header, click on the dropdown box, and select "add another user"




2. Enter the profile information for your proxy



3. Define the access by choosing to allow "complete access" or "select access"



4. If choosing "allow select access" activate the desired permissions by clicking the access statement for each functional area. A blue check mark will appear on selected statement.



5. To finalize the addition of the proxy user, respond to the Disclosure Agreement and click submit.

Disclosure Agreement
The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) secures the privacy of the educational records of an individual. The University may release information contained in the University Directory without the consent of the student, unless the student has notified the University in advance that such information is not to be released. But generally, information not contained in the Directory can only be released with the consent of the student. However, you may designate another person, called a proxy, who has permission to access parts of your educational record for purposes of convenience. This consent is necessary to comply with FERPA. By submittingly individuals to view your portal, the proxy will be able to view the information that you specified above.
By designating a proxy, you waive any rights under FERPA regarding these areas but maintain all other rights under the FERPA guidelines.

WORDS TO KNOW

ACADEMIC YEAR – Begins in August at the start of classes and continues through the spring semester, and concludes with the summer session.

ACADEMIC LOAD (ALSO KNOWN AS COURSE LOAD) -

Describes how many credit hours a student is taking during a semester. For instance, carrying a full academic load as an undergraduate student means taking at least 12 credit hours. However, enrolling in 12 hours each semester may not lead to graduation in four years. Consult with your academic advisor to learn more.

ALUMNI – Individuals who have attended or graduated from a particular college or university.

BLACKBOARD — An online, electronic, education platform designed to deliver course and/or organizational content and information. Instructors will often post things like the syllabus, readings and other course documents; assignments; videos; online tests and quizzes; and other materials for class. Blackboard can be accessed from http://blackboard.fmarion.edu

ABBREVIATIONS FOR BACCALAUREATE DEGREES

BA - Bachelor of Arts

BBA - Bachelor of Business Administration

BGS - Bachelor of General Studies

BS - Bachelor of Science

BSN - Bachelor of Science in Nursing

CATALOG — University's official publication of academic policies and procedures, programs of study, and course offerings for a particular academic year.

COMMENCEMENT – A ceremony that recognizes degree recipients in a given semester; currently there are ceremonies in May and December. Commencement may be commonly referred to as "graduation."

CREDIT HOUR - Standard unit of measuring coursework.

DROP/ADD – The period during which students can electronically make a change to their schedule by removing or adding a course from their schedule. This is usually the first week of the fall and spring terms, and the last date to drop/add is always listed on the Academic Calendar. Note that changes in the total number of credit hours taken for the semester can have an impact on financial aid and other matters, so always carefully consider drop/add choices.

FERPA — The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. Enacted in 1974, it protects the privacy of student education records. All educational institutions that receive federal funding must comply with FERPA.

FIRST-GENERATION STUDENT – A student whose parent(s) or legal guardian(s) have not completed a bachelor's degree and is the first in their family to attend a four-year college/university to attain a bachelor's degree.

LIFE GPA — All grades earned (excluding remedial coursework) at eligible public or independent institutions are included in the LIFE GPA. This includes any credit hours and GPA earned prior to high school graduation.

OMBUDSMAN — A staff member who helps students address and resolve non—academic conflicts, concerns, and other problems they may experience while attending Francis Marion. The Ombudsman assists the student in navigating the university procedures that will help them resolve their issue, and directs them to the appropriate school office or official.

PATRIOT PORTAL — a cloud—based space that provides secure access to important information for students, faculty and staff at FMU. For FMU students, the Portal is a one—stop shop for all academic and informational needs, including registration, class schedules, financial awards and more.

PREREQUISITE – Specific requirements that must be met prior to enrolling in a given class. Prerequisites may consist of courses, test scores, or enrollment in a specific program of study.

PROVOST — The senior academic administrator at a college or university. This person provides supervision and oversight to the university's curricular, instructional, and research activities.

RA – Resident assistant. RAs are trained undergraduate student leaders who help foster community between members of a residence hall's floor or wing; they also keep residents safe by enforcing university policies.

READING DAY— The day between the end of the semester and the start of the final exam period, during which no classes or exams are scheduled.

REGISTRAR – A university officer who is in charge of registering students and keeping academic records.

SYLLABUS – Document describing the objectives, outcomes, assessment activities, and structure of a course that is made available to students during the first week of classes.

TRANSCRIPT – Serves as the student's official academic record and the university's official record of credit and degrees awarded, including the courses taken by a student and the grades received in each course. Probations, suspensions, and disciplinary expulsions also appear on the transcript.

NOTES
